Bibles for Africa Central, Eastern, Southern and Western Africa



"It is to be with him, and he is to read it all the days of his life so that he may learn to revere the Lord his God and follow carefully all the words of this law and these decrees." (Deuteronomy 17:19)

Across Africa, God's people are eager for their own copy of His Word – copies that are carried to church, read out loud to family, and shared in the community. Bibles – so common in the West – can be just out of financial reach in parts of Africa and not available at all in rural areas. The Bibles project provides funds to purchase basic low-cost Bibles (\$7 each) for congregants and The Lutheran Study Bible (\$40 each) for seminary students and pastors.

Worship Structure Tin Roofs Africa



"Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labor in vain." (Psalm 127:1)

Across Africa, congregations are usually able to build the four walls of their churches using local materials like stones, wood, or baked mud bricks. While they usually fundraise for bags of cement, mortar, and other building materials, the roofing is often out of reach. As a result, structures might be left open to the sun (and rain) or topped with thatch roofs that require constant maintenance and repair. This project provides those last-step materials to finish Lutheran Churches with tin sheets. One piece of high-quality tin sheet costs on average \$15. The tools to install a roof (hammer, saw and machete/axe) cost \$25. The nails for a roof cost \$30. Trusses (the wooden structures supporting a roof) cost \$100. Together, the local Lutheran church and the LCMS provide a dry and long-lasting place for God to come to His people in the Word and the Sacraments.

Water Projects Africa



"Whoever believes in me, as the Scripture has said, Out of his heart will flow rivers of living water." (John 7:38)

In some parts of Africa, tremendous underground water reservoirs have been discovered, however the funds to survey and complete a deep well can be just out of financial reach for many in Africa, particularly in rural areas. Likewise, in many regions, unsuitable water sources can lead to cholera, typhoid fever, and other water-borne diseases. The Water Project offers opportunities to supplement local contributions to provide water for physical needs while opening doors through local churches to share God's Love with communities in need of Christ's Living Water.

Matongo Lutheran Theological College is a conservative confessional Lutheran college of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kenya, an Altar and Pulpit Fellowship partner of the LCMS. Matongo provides a variety of credentials to students from a Certificate in Deaconess Studies to a Bachelor's in Theology for pastoral candidates. The seminary draws students from across the greater Eastern Africa area. This project provides scholarships for pastoral candidates to attend Matongo from Eritrea, Ethiopia, Malawi, Rwanda, South Sudan, Sudan, Tanzania, and Uganda.



Mission Training Centers



"And He said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation. "He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved; but he who has disbelieved shall be condemned." (Mark 16:15-16)

In many parts of eastern Africa, many communities live in fear as they practice traditional African religions, animism and non-Christian religions. Many church bodies have asked the LCMS for help to train men from various parts of their country to undergo a short training course and return to their respective villages and areas as evangelists to help reach people with the Gospel. This often results in the planting of new congregations where no Lutheran church existed, and who in turn construct their own church building. A local church contributes to the training through pastoral instructors, lodging and food expenses. The LCMS provides teaching materials and sometimes missionary instructors. This project helps provide for the printing and distribution of coursework used by many to train evangelists in the short term and provide candidates for shepherd pastors who help build and grow the Church.

Students training to become pastors or deaconesses need printed and digital resources in the theological libraries of the seminaries and training centers in Africa. Some countries mandate certain requirements for libraries if a seminary hopes to award students with a recognized (accredited) degree. This project seeks to establish and fortify printed and digital collections, cataloging, transport and training for theological libraries of partner institutes and seminaries on the African continent. This will give students the ability to seek otherwise inaccessible theological knowledge, better equip them to provide pastoral care within their ministerial contexts and enable pastors and deaconesses toward faithful stewardship of their national churches.

Refugee Word and Sacrament Ministry



"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations , baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Matthew 28:19)

In the refugee camps of Africa, God's people have been gathered from various tribes and languages into one place. Lutherans tend to congregate together where they worship and pray for their homes far away. Lutherans in the refugee camps ask for pastoral visits to provide catechetical instruction, preparation for baptism, and administration of Holy Communion. This project enables a local pastor seconded from the local partner Lutheran church to be sent to the camps for Word and Sacrament ministry three times a year. While it is not enough, these visits temporarily meet the most urgent pastoral needs of the congregations as they prepare their own lay leaders for seminary studies.

Hunger, Famine & Drought Relief

Most people in Africa live in rural areas and earn a subsistence living that sustains them between seasons of rain and crop-planting. However, sometimes, delays in or excessive seasonal weather can create water shortages, delay crop planting and insufficient harvests, which can lead to drought, famine, and conflict over resources. This project intends to work through churches in eastern Africa to show mercy in such times and in a way that helps meet physical and spiritual needs.



Motorcycles for Evangelists



"And He said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation. "He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved; but he who has disbelieved shall be condemned." (Mark 16:15-16)

Congregations in many parts of Africa are remote and can be in difficult to reach rural areas. Pastors and Evangelists in the church are frequently unable to access public transportation in more rural areas and consequently are unable to make visits to their parishioners or preaching stations as often as they would like. Motorcycles enable a pastor or evangelist to reach congregations, preaching stations, parishioners, and unchurched peoples who otherwise would be out of reach. This project provides funds to purchase one motorcycle for a pastor or evangelist in sub Saharan Africa.

Local Church Leadership Development & Care



"Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." (1 Peter 3:15)

Telling people about Jesus can be easy. Providing ongoing pastoral care to God's people among the influence of traditional beliefs and false religions is not. Village pastors in Africa often serve in remote and isolated places, rarely gathering together as pastors for mutual edification in the word, fellowship, and opportunities to collaborate together in that realm where theology meets real-life situations. The churches with whom we work frequently ask for Continuing Education courses for their pastors. This project provides means for pastors and spouses of a church body or geographic region to gather together for a course or conference provided by a church leader, local seminary professor, or a missionary – but always on a topic of their choice. Pastors return home with immediate impact on their ability to provide pastoral care to members, preach into their context, and reach out to their community as they joyfully bring the Gospel.

Mission Opportunities

The mission designated area within the Africa Region encompasses an area over twice the size of the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii. Working in the context of Africa makes project planning through the budget process a challenge as situations change rapidly. Along with that, African cultures have a tendency to focus on a strong past and present and a weak future. Funded Mission Opportunities Projects allow LCMS missionaries to react rapidly to change, needs and opportunities through mission partner church bodies when in accord with mission objectives and outcomes. Support often helps churches in these areas become more self-sufficient and self-sustaining.

Christian-based training is available across Africa to help newly elected church leaders learn a biblical approach to management that provides capacity-building skills with an emphasis on Christian values of integrity, stewardship, and accountability. This project would provide a scholarship for church leaders to acquire knowledge in financial management, leadership, administration, project management, or similar skill to aid them servant leadership in the growth of God's Kingdom.

Our missionaries travel many miles in an effort to garner support, move their families to distant lands to share the Gospel, establish long-term relationships within varied cultures, and every two years return stateside to repeat the process. Missionary Development and Care provides education on spiritual issues missionaries encounter and identifies the tools employed to support and care for them into generations-long service on this field. Annual gatherings of LCMS missionaries in Africa provide an opportunity for focus on fellowship, continuing education, worship with Communion, counseling, and spiritual care. Provision is made for a gathering, host team, childcare and related activities.





Africa Field Office

The LCMS Africa region has more than doubled the number of missionaries serving here in 2016. The LCMS Africa Field Office provides the space for collaboration between the Regional Director and regional, area, and local staff who together direct and support the work from Sudan to South Africa, and Kenya to Sierra Leone. The Field Office provides the spiritual, emotional, physical, and logistical support for the missionaries, staff, projects, and relationships in this region. This project provides the funding for the Africa Field Office including salaries for local staff, utilities, internet, security, and maintenance so that the Field Office can serve as a collaboration base for LCMS mission efforts within the Africa Region.

CLETCO Regional Seminary Congo-Brazzaville

Established in the 1980's by refugees from neighboring countries, the Lingala-speaking Lutheran Church in Congo-Brazzaville continues to grow and is blessed with strong pastors trained at the French-speaking Lutheran seminary in Togo (CLET). However, the language differences and expense of sending men to foreign lands for pastoral training have led this church in the Fall of 2017 to begin their first year of a local seminary that provides first-year of training for students before transferring to the CLET. Combined with local church contribution, this project would allow student scholarships for Academic Year 2020 - 2021 and enable the start of construction for a seminary facility that can prepare students to contextualize Lutheran theology in daily life and share the Gospel with Lingala speaking people.

Agricultural Consultancy East Africa



"Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." (Matthew 9:37-38)

Most populations in eastern Africa are located in rural areas making a subsistence living and sometimes barely able to endure until the next rainy season. This project allows agricultural consultants to work with Lutheran churches in eastern Africa to help people learn valuable methods for farming, resource management and family living according to Biblical principles. The Lord has used these volunteer consultants to help congregations avoid crop diseases, increase harvests, teach stewardship, and demonstrate Christ's love. By strengthening the skills and competencies of the church, the local church can reach out to proclaim the Gospel.

EECMY Mekane Yesus Seminary Ethiopia



"Keep watch over yourselves and all the flock of which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers. Be shepherds of the church of God, which he bought with his own blood." (Acts 20:28)

Mekane Yesus Seminary in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia trains pastors in a catchment area for about 8 million Lutherans. A Masters in Theology is provided. Currently the Mekane Yesus church has almost 14,000 congregations with only 2,800 pastors. This project provides scholarships to complete one of a two-year accredited program in Addis Ababa allows pastors to lead and instruct other pastors in various colleges and training centers and addresses the shortage of pastors within the remote areas of this largely agricultural nation. Cost for a student to participate in the Master's of Theology program is about USD \$2,575 per year.

EELC Seminary Ethiopia

The Ethiopian Evangelical Lutheran Church (EELC) operates a seminary in Asella, Ethiopia to serve their conservative and confessional church body. This small school provides instruction to a cohort of up to fifteen students in a four-year course leading to their ordination in the EELC. The cohort studies all the way through the course to graduation before another intake of students is accepted. Seminary students are able to study and remain close to home and their home congregations where they are likely already serving as lay leaders. Supporting this seminary allows the church to provide ordained servants to their congregations across Ethiopia.

The Lutheran Center for Theological Studies (Centre Luthérien d'Études Théologiques) in Dapaong, Togo serves as a regional seminary for the Frenchspeaking countries of West and Central Africa: Benin, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Democratic Republic of Congo, Guinea, Ivory Coast and Togo. Students and their families travel from their home countries to live and study at CLET for three years in preparation for ordination and the pastoral ministry. Funds for CLET provide for students' living and educational expenses.

Francophone Matongo Scholarships French-speaking / West & Central Africa



"The student is not above the teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like their teacher." (Luke 6:40)

Although people are eager to hear about Jesus and the Lutheran church continues to grow in Francophone Africa, there is a lack of opportunities for pastors and church leaders to receive a bachelor degree in theology from a French-speaking confession Lutheran seminary. However, such programs do exist in Africa at the English-speaking Matongo Seminary in Kenya. Funds for this project will sponsor accredited theological formation to individuals from francophone Africa who have demonstrated academic aptitude, character integrity, and a conversational level of English who are from a confessional Lutheran church in Francophone Africa, and whose church is making strides to support their pastors, national church, and their theological institutes. This will be most beneficial for students from countries require pastors to hold a minimum of a bachelor's degree in theology, so that they can continue to grow the church and tell communities and their people about Christ.

Scholarships for Accredited Theological Education French-speaking / West & Central Africa

As churches grow in Africa, there is an increased desire to train men to become pastors at locations within their countries and close to home. Instructors for seminary students require advanced degrees to ensure sound instruction. Pastors who are graduates of the CLET, have been ordained for three years and remained faithful could apply for an advanced degree or seek language instruction to aid in advanced learning. Learning institutions staffed with instructors with advanced degrees have the opportunity to students an accredited and recognized degree that will enable them to sustain and grow the Lord's church within their country.

Expatriate Guest Professors French-speaking / West & Central Africa

Within the area of LCMS mission work in francophone Africa, over 500 different languages are spoken. Although a common language, French is used by roughly 30 percent of the over 186 million people in this area. In this area where traditional and false religions and ethnic situations hold people captive in fear, the news of salvation through Christ brings peace and comfort. Although ambitious church leaders have initiated two additional local seminaries to train men as shepherd pastors who can share the Gospel in their native languages, there are not enough instructors. The number of French-speaking LCMS missionaries has dropped over 50% over the past two years. This project aims to fill this missionary instructor gap by sponsoring confessional Lutheran guest teachers to provide intensive classes and seminars to ensure theological students graduate to return to their home countries and languages to tell others about salvation through Jesus. Specifically, funds will be used to sponsor guest teachers from North America and Europe to offer seminars and teach intensive classes in OIM partner churches and theological institutes in West and Central Africa.

ELCG Seminary Ghana

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Ghana (ELCG) is one of the LCMS's oldest mission partner church bodies in Africa, having been established by LCMS missionaries in 1958. The ELCG currently has an estimated 29,000 members in 200 congregations and over 300 preaching points served by 25 pastors. The seminary in Accra currently has 14 students. This project augments local resources given to support the seminary in training pastors for the ELCG. A recently built seminary has the capacity to house up to 60 seminarians. Funds of this project will be used for students' food, medical expenses, country travel, books and materials as well as building and vehicle maintenance.

The love for the Gospel has led this church to establish a local training center for men to complete their first year of pastoral training before traveling to continue further studies at the French-speaking CLET in Togo. Support for this effort enables scholarships for students to begin this current 2020-2021 academic year and allow the Gospel to continue to spread in Guinea.

Hospital and Prison Ministry Guinea



"The Kingwill reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." (Matthew 25:40)

In many parts of Africa, those who are detained or serving prison sentences are given only meager food rations. The responsibility to provide the needed sustenance falls mainly on the prisoners' families and friends. The situation for hospital patients is the same– the family and friends of admitted patients must bring food. Oftentimes, family members and friends travel to the regional prison and hospital at great personal expense – leaving very little to actually give upon arrival. In Guinea in western Africa, pastors and members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Guinea-Conakry make pastoral care and evangelism visits to prisons and hospitals to encourage by prayer and material charity. This project aims to provide the national church with additional clothes, clean rice, soap, bibles, and other necessities for distribution by pastors and lay leaders 3 times per month during such visits. This project supports students enrolled in pastoral studies at the CELC-SL's Christ Evangelical Lutheran Theological Seminary (CELTS-formerly the Coordinating Center for Theological Studies (CCTS)) which prepares pastors for service in Sierra Leone and Liberia. Funds are used for student transportation, meals, materials and books, and center security.

During the civil wars in Liberia and Sierra Leone, many Lutheran refugees found themselves in Jembe, Sierra Leone. Despite the war, the Lutheran church continued to grow, and in 2002 the Coordinating Center for Theological Studies (CCTS) was started in a single building as a way to train men to become pastors in both Liberia and Sierra Leone. After years of planning, the CCTS transitioned in January 2020 to become the Christ Evangelical Lutheran Theological Seminary (CELTS), and through help from LCMS missionaries and resources, were able to establish a dormitory and library through the Chemnitz Library Initiative. This project intends to preserve the efforts to create this learning institution by enclosing within a protective wall, prevent loss of land due to encroachment, and enable more men to become pastors who return to the home areas to tell a generation of young people who lost their parents about Jesus. Specifically, the new seminary very much needs a compound wall to protect the facility from thieves and land poachers.
